





Know! Alert - Weed Awareness

The U.S. Surgeon General has issued an advisory regarding marijuana use and the developing adolescent brain. He states that the increases in access to this drug, in multiple and highly potent forms, along with a false and dangerous perception of safety among youth, merits a nationwide call to action.

Weed – as most young people call it – is a highly used drug among adolescents in the U.S., second only to alcohol. Nearly 14% of eighth graders, 33% of tenth graders, and 44% of twelfth graders report having used marijuana at some point in their youth.

It is not the drug it used to be either. Marijuana today is much stronger than in the past, whether smoked, vaped, drunk or eaten. The average amount of THC (the component that causes euphoria and intoxication) in marijuana increased from 4% in 1995 to 12% in 2014. In some states where dispensaries have popped up, marijuana is now available with average concentrated THC levels between 18-23 percent. Even more extreme, marijuana "dabs" and "waxes," which are highly concentrated marijuana products, reach THC levels as high as nearly 76 percent.

The choices for consumption go far beyond the "pot" brownies of the past as well. There are marijuana-infused teas, coffees, gummies, suckers, chocolates, mints, caramels, and assorted cookies - to name a few. Highly intoxicating edibles have become increasingly popular and are finding their way into the hands and mouths of adolescents and young children (both unintentionally and intentionally). And because edible marijuana takes time to absorb and produce its effects, the risk of overdose increases – even when use is intentional.

As shared in the Surgeon General's advisory, marijuana "acts by binding to cannabinoid receptors in the brain which produce a variety of effects, including euphoria, intoxication, and memory and motor

impairments. These same cannabinoid receptors are also critical for brain development. They are part of the endocannabinoid system, which impacts the formation of brain circuits important for decision making, mood and responding to stress."

The brain continues to develop into a person's mid-twenties, and during that time is especially vulnerable to the effects of addictive substances. The earlier the onset of use and the higher the concentration of THC, the greater the risks of physical dependence, addiction, and other negative consequences.

Further research is needed to understand the full impact of THC on the developing adolescent brain. However, current studies show that **regular marijuana use during adolescence is associated with**:

- Changes in the brain that involve attention, memory, decision-making and motivation
- Impaired movement, timing and coordination
- Anxiety, agitation, paranoia, and psychosis
- Increased risk for and early onset of psychotic disorders, such as schizophrenia
- Greater likelihood of misusing opioids
- Impaired learning and decline in IQ
- Increased rates of school absence and dropout
- Impaired school performance that jeopardizes professional and social achievements
- Deterioration of overall life satisfaction and suicide attempts

The Surgeon General's advisory is intended to, "raise awareness of the known and potential harms to developing brains. These harms are costly to individuals and to our society, impacting mental health and educational achievement and raising the risks of addiction and misuse of other substances."

Parents and educators are encouraged to talk to the young people in their lives to share this pertinent information, allowing them to ask questions and discuss openly. At a time when marijuana use is becoming more and more "normalized" in our society, the time to have this conversation is now.

Academic Recognition Ceremony

On Thursday, October 24, the Medina Performing Arts Center was filled with proud MHS parents as 248 students in grades 10-12 were invited to attend an Academic Recognition Night. During the evening, the students were presented with a certificate that recognized their academic achievement at the end of the 2018-2019 school year.

Beginning this school year, all students, including seniors, will be recognized based on the Latin honors system. Students who achieved a cumulative GPA of 4.0-4.29 were awarded certificates for magna cum laude and students who achieved a cumulative GPA of 4.3 and above were awarded certificates for summa cum laude. Mr. Tim Jack, social studies teacher, was the honorary speaker for the evening. Mrs. Jessica Niemantsverdiet, science teacher, Mr. Scott Quade, language arts teacher, and Mr. Jeff Harrison, principal presented the students with their certificates.

This is the first time the high school has made this presentation recognizing student academic achievement at these grade levels. This is a new tradition that will be carried forward annually and is a result of the District's current five-year strategic plan which was largely based on community feedback.

Student Council News

On Sunday, October 13, 2019 over 50 Medina High School Student Council members met with Andrew Holden, Extension Educator in Agriculture and Natural Resources from The Ohio State University, to learn the importance of composting. He was able to teach students how to compost by using ratios of nitrogen and carbon, and what products are able to be composted. Members even started their own batch outside the main cafeteria doors where two composting barrels are located. StuCo's plan is to start a composting program at lunches to teach the student body a new way of recycling and keeping waste out of landfills. The program will start this semester.

Student Council then headed over to the square to help SustainEd improve the Community Garden. There the students worked to lay down soil, dig holes for new plants, rake, mulch, paint rocks for a children's section, build a fairy garden, weed and clean the surrounding areas for two hours. Supporting a great community project, the students had a full afternoon of education and work and are excited to get started on this year's service project of composting. This latest project follows the previous year-long StuCo service projects still in progress including the nesting boxes for bluebirds, the pollination garden to save the bees, and the clean water initiative.

On Tuesday, October 22, 2019 MHS Student Council hosted national motivational speaker Judson Laipply. He is the world's first YouTube celebrity, having had the first global viral video with his finale "The Evolution of Dance." Mr. Laipply did two presentations for the school and focused on dealing with change, while reminding students about the importance of growth and evolving. In the afternoon he presented a small group leadership workshop to 100 building leaders chosen by advisors and coaches. The kids had fun in hands-on, active events as they learned about team building, communication, and personalization as a leader.

Career Exploration Opportunities Coming to MHS

With the expansion of gifted services into Medina High School, there will be increased opportunities for students to explore what they will be when they grow up! The gifted intervention specialist has been collaborating with the Business Advisory Council, the Medina County Economic Development Corporation and MHS staff in order to develop a semester-long program to include job shadowing experience. This credit flex opportunity (.5) will provide participants with an overview of the entire job search process, to include relevant career information from in-house staff and guest speakers on current job markets and trends. Topics will include crafting a cover letter and résumé polishing, cultivating an appropriate digital footprint, interview skills, evaluating job offers and learning from not being offered a job. There will be eight weeks of job shadowing experience at one or two local sites in a field that the applicant holds interest. Shadowing will allow a student to understand numerous positions which contribute to a company's success and the type and level of schooling necessary for each. At the culmination, students will offer a presentation about the job shadowing experience to highlight what has been learned with a team of CEO educators. This information will then be available to future participants as they seek to enter the CEO program to aid in narrowing career interests. Student Fees

FAFSA - Class of 2020 - 7 Things You Need Before You Fill Out The FAFSA FORM

If you need financial aid to help you pay for college, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form. The 2020-2021 FAFSA form will be made available as of Oct. 1, 2019. You should fill it out as soon as possible on the official government site, fafsa.gov.

It'll be easier to complete the FAFSA form if you gather what you need ahead of time. Below are 7 items you'll need to find before Oct 1:

- 1. Your FSA ID
- 2. Your Social Security number
- 3. Your driver's license number
- 4. Your 2017 tax records
- 5. Records of your untaxed income
- 6. Records of your assets (money)
- 7. List of school(s) you are interested in attending

All students are required to have a parking pass in order to park in the school lots. Students may park in Lots B, C, E and F with a pass. Students *are not* to park in the lots of any of the area buildings including the rec center parking lot. Parking passes can be purchased daily at the Hub. Passes cost \$40 for the full year. Passes are reduced by \$10 per quarter for new student drivers/parking pass applicants. The required paperwork can be found on the high school website. There will be regular sweeps of the parking lots to check for parking passes. Cars found without a pass will get a warning sticker with directions on what to do. If there is no parking pass during the next sweep, the car will be booted. Please note there will be a \$ 20.00 fee assessed if we boot a car. We ask for parent support by making sure your student who is driving to school is purchasing a parking pass.

Planning a Move?

If you currently reside in the Medina City School District and have recently moved, or plan to move to a new address within the district, you will need to provide proof of residency to the Medina City School District Registration Office. One of the following documents will be accepted as proof of residency: current utility bill, mortgage contract, purchase contract, lease agreement, insurance statement on the dwelling, or a letter from your builder indicating a possession date within 90 days of enrollment in the district. If you are unable to provide any of the approved documents, please complete the Residency Affidavit, have it notarized, and submit to the Registration Office. If you are moving out of the district during the school year, please notify the guidance secretaries so that the withdrawal process can begin. Please be certain to promptly register in your new school district and complete a records request so that we may release educational records to the new school.

Did you know?

Mail being sent home to parents is usually addressed "To the Parent of:" and the student's name. Sometimes that mail is returned to us by the post office because the child's last name is different than the parent's last name, and the post office says that is undeliverable as addressed. This is especially true if you live in an apartment. By the time all of this happens, several weeks can have passed. If this applies to you, please make sure to notify the post office of all last names that mail may be addressed to for delivery. Your help is appreciated.

Reporting Student Absences

- · If a student will be missing school, a parent needs to call the Attendance line. The parent will need to spell the student's last name, give his/her school ID#, and the reason that he/she is absent.
- · If a parent does not call, the student will be marked "unexcused absent" and an automated call will be generated at 10:30 a.m. each morning.
- · If a student is late because of an orthodontist, doctor, dentist, court appointments, etc., the absence will be excused if the student brings in a school excuse from the doctor, dentist, etc. to the Attendance Office.

If a Student Becomes III in School

He/she needs to go to the closest neighborhood office or clinic with a pass from his/her teacher. The neighborhood secretary or the nurse will call the parents for permission for the student to leave school. If the parent gives permission for the student to leave, the secretary will give the student a pass that MUST be brought to the Attendance Office. The person picking up the student, MUST come in to sign the student out in the book at the front desk of the main office.

STUDENTS SHOULD NOT BE USING THEIR CELL PHONE TO CALL PARENTS DIRECTLY TO GO HOME ILL - An MHS employee must talk to the parent before a child can be released.

Tardiness to School

Oversleeping, car trouble, power failures, traffic problems, frozen car locks are all unexcused tardies. A note or call from a parent to the Attendance Office regarding the reason is always appreciated and will be noted for your student's records. A Principal or his/her designee shall make the final determination between excused or unexcused tardy if necessary.

Leaving Early

Parents need to send in a note requesting that the student leave early for court, an orthodontist appointment, doctor's appointment, etc. The note needs the date, reason for the absence, and the time that the student is to leave school. The parent does not have to come in to sign out the student. If a parent calls instead of sending a written note, the parent will need to come into the main office to sign

out the student at the front desk. Parents need to realize that it will take time to find the student, especially if the student is in a gym class or at lunch.

Planned Absences

The student needs to tell his/her teachers about the absence and make arrangements to make up the work. The parent needs to call the attendance line in advance and give the dates and reason the student will be missing school, such as vacation, surgery, etc.

Vacations

Ohio law does not specifically allow vacation travel to be considered an excused absence from school. In situations that are essentially unavoidable, schools are permitted to grant excused absences in order to travel. Medina City Schools allows up to 5 excused vacation days per year.

A Request for Vacation Travel is required to be filled out and turned into the Attendance Office well in advance of the intended absence. The form can be found under Forms on the MCS website, on the MHS website, on Blackboard under the Forms tab in the MHS Student Organization and this link.

<u>IMPORTANT NOTICE</u>: If a student will miss more than approximately 65 hours (10 days) due to a vacation, parents/guardians are required to un-enroll their student from the Medina City Schools and re-enroll them upon return from vacation. This is done by contacting the Office of Registration at 330-636-3100. Questions concerning this procedure may be directed to Dr. Kristine Quallich, Asst. Superintendent, at 330-636-3092.

Medications

All medications must be delivered <u>by an ADULT ONLY to the SCHOOL NURSE</u>. The medication must be in a new, unopened container. Students must never possess any type of medication without documentation from a physician allowing him/her to do so. Only school health personnel are permitted to receive and log medications. Clinic hours are 8:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday when school is in session.


