Now Available!

Medina City Schools Food Service Department has agreed to be a pilot school for PaySchools to utilize our vending machines, and their software, to enable students to purchase snacks from some our vending machines at the High School using their meal accounts. If a student does not have cash and the Café is closed, they will still be able to purchase snacks using their meal account number at these vending machines. All snacks in these machines meet the USDA Smart Snacks in Schools nutritional standards. The instructions on how to use the machines are located on the outside of the vending machines. Optional Insurance for Student Chromebooks

Chromebooks have been distributed to all students attending classes at the high school. Students, parents/guardians are being offered an optional \$30.00 insurance to purchase for each school year per student.

This optional coverage will cover the following:

- If a student breaks or damages the Chromebook beyond repair, the student will be given a replacement Chromebook at no additional charge. This coverage provides the replaced Chromebook once per year. Additional insurance will not be offered once used during that school year. If it is found that the student purposely damaged or broke the device, insurance cannot be used during this incident.
- If a student breaks or damages the Chromebook and it can be repaired without cost, they will not lose their optional insurance coverage.
- If a student purchases optional insurance coverage, they will be able to use it one time (per school year) to replace or repair the device.
- This optional insurance does not cover lost or stolen devices. Students who lose their device will be charged the full replacement cost.
- Assigned power cord is covered by the optional insurance.
- Students, parents/guardians have until September 16th of this school year to waive the optional insurance. Students, parents/guardians will be assessed the \$30 insurance fee after the 16th. This fee will show up on the student's fee schedule. <u>If you wish to opt</u>

out of the Chromebook insurance, please send an email to balask@medinabees.org, expressing your intent to opt out on or before September 16, 2019.

Only Medina employed technology department employees should fix a damaged Chromebook. If someone other than a Medina technology department employee attempts to fix a damaged Chromebook or alter the Chromebook in any manner, all warranties and optional insurance will become void and the student becomes responsible for all charges related to fixing/replacing the Chromebook.

Blackboard

Blackboard is a helpful communication tool for families. All students belong to the Student Organization in Blackboard. This is where students can find bell schedules, exam schedules, assignments, student bulletins/morning announcements, as well as other information posted throughout the school year. Seniors are also be assigned to the Class of 2020 Organization. Information regarding 2019-20 dates and events for seniors are posted in this organization.

You may not be aware of a growing problem facing many of our students--hunger.



Currently, there are several hundred Medina High School students facing hunger and food insecurity on a daily basis. To combat this problem, the staff of MHS, along with the support of community members, have created a food program called "Feed The Bees". The goal of the program is to provide students in need with food during the day, while at the same time providing our most at-risk population with groceries to take home for the weekend and over school breaks. In response to this crisis, our faculty, staff, and administration has already donated over 1,000 granola bars and collected over \$1,000. We need help from the greater community to have a lasting impact.

Programs like this exist at some elementary schools in our district, but we would like to implement this at the middle and high school level. We cannot allow our

students to go hungry. With the combined effort of Medina City Schools, local businesses, and various religious institutions, we can make a difference.

We are currently looking for donations of non-perishable items in non-breakable containers such as: peanut butter, jelly, canned soups, pasta, spaghetti sauce, rice, instant oatmeal, cereal, fruit (canned or cups), tuna, macaroni & cheese, etc. We are also accepting donations of toiletries and feminine hygiene products. Cash donations and checks payable to Medina High School are always welcome. All donations can be sent or delivered to the Medina High School main office.

All prior years school fees must have been paid by September 3 in order to be eligible to purchase an online ticket.

All seniors who have not turned in their proof of Meningitis vaccine will be unable to purchase a ticket online until the proof of immunization is turned in the main office or nurse's clinic.

All students who have not completed their Registration Gateway Back to School update will be unable to purchase a ticket online until the update is complete.

Student Fees

At the high school, there is a general fee of \$15 which covers the agenda, student ID and graduation costs. Full day Medina County Career students do not receive an MHS ID and therefore the fee is reduced to \$10. Course fees are outlined in the Registration Guide. Pay to Participate fees are assessed once the team rosters are complete.

Fee Bills for current year fees will be mailed after all fees have been added, generally mid-September. At the end of the 2nd, 3rd and 4th grading periods, report cards will be held in the main office until all fees have been paid. Students will receive a fee bill in lieu of their report card.

All fees must be paid in order to purchase dance tickets with the exception of the Homecoming Dance. For the Homecoming Dance, only the PRIOR YEAR fees need to be paid. Fees can be paid to Mrs. Platz in the main office using a check (payable to Medina High School), cash or money order. Fees can be paid online via Payforit.net with your Visa, Mastercard or ACH check.

Start With Hello Week: September 23–27, 2019 A Youth Violence Prevention Program by Sandy Hook Promise



Social isolation is the overwhelming feeling of being left out, lonely or treated like you are invisible. It is a growing epidemic in the United States and within our schools. Excessive feelings of isolation can be associated with violent and suicidal behavior. In fact, one study reports that chronic loneliness increases our risk of an early death by 14%. Furthermore, young people who are isolated can become victims of bullying, violence and/or depression. As a result, many further pull away from society, struggle with learning and social development and/or choose to hurt themselves or others. Start With Hello teaches students, grades 2-12, the skills they need to reach out to and include those who may be

dealing with chronic social isolation and create a culture of inclusion and connectedness within their school or youth organization.

During the week of September 23–27, hundreds of schools and youth organizations from across the United States will participate in Sandy Hook Promise's fourth annual Start With Hello Week. It brings attention to the growing epidemic of social isolation in our schools and communities and empowers young people to create a culture of inclusion and connectedness within their school or youth organization. Start With Hello Week raises awareness and educates students and the community through Start With Hello trainings, advertising, activities, public proclamations, media events, student contests, and school awards.

Positive Coaching Alliance

On August 15th, the Medina Bees Varsity, JV and freshman football squads took part in a Positive Coaching Alliance (PCA) workshop entitled "Making Teammates Better". PCA-Cleveland is a partner

with the Medina Athletic Boosters to help support and educate our Coaches, Student-Athletes and Parents in the best way to help create "Better Athletes, Better People".

The "Making Teammates Better" team workshop centered around self-improvement, finding motivation, and helping teammates improve both on and off the field. All Students Must Have a Parking Pass

All students are required to have a parking pass in order to park in the school lots. Students may park in Lots B, C, E and F with a pass. Students *are not* to park in the lots of any of the area buildings including the rec center parking lot. Parking passes can be purchased daily at the Hub. Passes cost \$40. The required paperwork can be found on the high school website. There will be regular sweeps of the parking lots to check for parking passes. Cars found without a pass will get a warning sticker with directions on what to do. If there is no parking passed during the next sweep, the car will be booted. Please note there will be a \$ 20.00 fee assessed if we boot a car. We ask for parent support by making sure your student who is driving to school is purchasing a parking pass.

FAFSA - Class of 2020 - 7 Things You Need Before You Fill Out The FAFSA FORM

If you need financial aid to help you pay for college, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form. The 2020-2021 FAFSA form will be made available as of Oct. 1, 2019. You should fill it out as soon as possible on the official government site, fafsa.gov.

It'll be easier to complete the FAFSA form if you gather what you need ahead of time. Below are 7 items you'll need to find before Oct 1:

- 1. Your FSA ID
- 2. Your Social Security number
- 3. Your driver's license number
- 4. Your 2017 tax records
- 5. Records of your untaxed income
- 6. Records of your assets (money)
- 7. List of school(s) you are interested in attending

College 102 and Senior Seminars

Planning a Move?

If you currently reside in the Medina City School District and have recently moved, or plan to move to a new address within the district, you will need to provide proof of residency to the Medina City School District Registration Office. One of the following documents will be accepted as proof of residency: current utility bill, mortgage contract, purchase contract, lease agreement, insurance statement on the

dwelling, or a letter from your builder indicating a possession date within 90 days of enrollment in the district. If you are unable to provide any of the approved documents, please complete the Residency Affidavit, have it notarized, and submit to the Registration Office. If you are moving out of the district during the school year, please notify the guidance secretaries so that the withdrawal process can begin. Please be certain to promptly register in your new school district and complete a records request so that we may release educational records to the new school.

Did you know?

Mail being sent home to parents is usually addressed "To the Parent of:" and the student's name. Sometimes that mail is returned to us by the post office because the child's last name is different than the parent's last name, and the post office says that is undeliverable as addressed. This is especially true if you live in an apartment. By the time all of this happens, several weeks can have passed. If this applies to you, please make sure to notify the post office of all last names that mail may be addressed to for delivery. Your help is appreciated.

Reporting Student Absences

If a student will be missing school, a parent needs to call the Attendance line. The parent will need to spell the student's last name, give his/her school ID#, and the reason that he/she is absent.
If a parent does not call, the student will be marked "unexcused absent" and an automated call will be generated at 10:30 a.m. each morning.

· If a student is late because of an orthodontist, doctor, dentist, court appointments, etc., the absence will be excused if the student brings in a school excuse from the doctor, dentist, etc. to the Attendance Office.

If a Student Becomes III in School

He/she needs to go to the closest neighborhood office or clinic with a pass from his/her teacher. The neighborhood secretary or the nurse will call the parents for permission for the student to leave school. If the parent gives permission for the student to leave, the secretary will give the student a pass that MUST be brought to the Attendance Office. The person picking up the student, MUST come in to sign the student out in the book at the front desk of the main office.

STUDENTS SHOULD NOT BE USING THEIR CELL PHONE TO CALL PARENTS DIRECTLY TO GO HOME ILL - An MHS employee must talk to the parent before a child can be released.

Tardiness to School

Oversleeping, car trouble, power failures, traffic problems, frozen car locks are all unexcused tardies. A note or call from a parent to the Attendance Office regarding the reason is always appreciated and will be noted for your student's records. A Principal or his/her designee shall make the final determination between excused or unexcused tardy if necessary.

As the student accumulates tardies to school, the following consequences may result:

4 tardies ~ One (1) ASD
8 tardies ~ (2) ASDs
12 tardies ~ 2 hour Saturday school and notification
16 tardies ~ 4 hour Saturday school and notification

Leaving Early

Parents need to send in a note requesting that the student leave early for court, an orthodontist appointment, doctor's appointment, etc. The note needs the date, reason for the absence, and the time that the student is to leave school. The parent does not have to come in to sign out the student. If a parent calls instead of sending a written note, the parent will need to come into the main office to sign out the student at the front desk. Parents need to realize that it will take time to find the student, especially if the student is in a gym class or at lunch.

Planned Absences

The student needs to tell his/her teachers about the absence and make arrangements to make up the work. The parent needs to call the attendance line in advance and give the dates and reason the student will be missing school, such as vacation, surgery, etc.

Vacations

Ohio law does not specifically allow vacation travel to be considered an excused absence from school. In situations that are essentially unavoidable, schools are permitted to grant excused absences in order to travel. Medina City Schools allows up to 5 excused vacation days per year.

A Request for Vacation Travel is required to be filled out and turned into the Attendance Office well in advance of the intended absence. The form can be found under Forms on the MCS website, on the MHS website, on Blackboard under the Forms tab in the MHS Student Organization and this link. Request for Vacation Travel Form

<u>IMPORTANT NOTICE</u>: If a student will miss more than approximately 65 hours (10 days) due to a vacation, parents/guardians are required to un-enroll their student from the Medina City Schools and re-enroll them upon return from vacation. This is done by contacting the Office of Registration at 330-636-3100. Questions concerning this procedure may be directed to Dr. Kristine Quallich, Asst. Superintendent, at 330-636-3092.

Medications

All medications must be delivered <u>by an ADULT ONLY to the SCHOOL NURSE</u>. The medication must be in a new, unopened container.
